An award ceremony/graduation recognition was held for the four seniors who were Wathen Aviation High School's first graduating class. These four were: Kristina Cruz, valedictorian and yearbook editor, Aaron Kiss, Don Kettinger, great grandson of Flavio Madriaga, the former owner/operator of the airport, and Kyle Saldana.

Some serious and not so serious awards were given. In the serious category were scholarships to the three boys to complete their airframe and powerplant license at San Bernardino Valley College. These were the courtesy of the Thomas W. Wathen Foundation. Needless to say, these three were surprised and very excited about attending in the fall. In the more light hearted category was the start of a tradition of giving white flying scarves to each senior. This has nothing to do with education, but everything to do with flying traditions that date back to WWI Aviators. The ceremonial first scarf was presented by 95-year-old Flabobian Sam Pratt. Sam was a soldier on the ground in WWI and watched the aviators duel it out in the skies above the trenches and ground fire. Also assisting was Jim Pyle, EAA Chapter 1 Lam Duck President, who came dressed in a leather jacket, cloth helmet and flying goggles. He displayed his genuine WWI replica flask/body armor and talked about the battle in the skies against the Folkers and the Messerschmits. He has such a compelling way about him and was so convincing that the uninitiated would be hard pressed to know that he had never been there.

There can only be one Wathen Aviation High School first graduating class, and this was it. We did not have the press and government officials and a big band, but we did have the important people there: Flabobians. Andy Andersen captured these moments on film and many of these photos will find their way into the soon to be published WAHS Yearbook. Dena Saldana videotaped the event and it will be available for future graduating classes to see what it was like "back then."

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DC-3 to become flying classroom for WAHS

Jon Goldenbaum recently ferried a DC-3 into Flabob Airport, initiating a new program on behalf of the historic airport and all the student-oriented activities going on there. The DC-3, total time XXXXX hours, will be repainted and refurbished before taking to the skies with students from Wathen Aviation High School and members of the high school recruiting team. They will visit EAA Chapter events, Fly-Ins and other aviation events considered appropriate to their objectives. There will likely be some trips to the annual EAA AirVenture in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The DC-3 began its existence as a C-47 in service to the RAF and later to the RCAF. Originally configured as a transport for military brass, it is believed to have been used for a period by Winston Churchill. In 1958, changes were made for conversion to DC-3 status, whereafter it served for a number of smaller airlines and charter operations before winding up in the hands of Jerry Barto, who took his first flying lesson at Flabob Airport when he was 12 years old. Barto, a successful real estate developer, donated the aircraft to the Wathen Aviation Organization this spring.

The aircraft will become an integral part of presentations by the Wathen Recruiting/Ambassador Team headed up by First Lt. Mary Guest, USAF Reserves, Hualdo and Leandro Mendoza and SRA Justin Taylor, all of whom have had close ties with Flabob. Jon Goldenbaum will share piloting responsibilities with several other people.

“The DC-3 will become a kind of flying classroom for our high school students,” said Goldenbaum, vice president of Poly Fiber, which is located at Flabob. “When it’s not winging its way to or from aviation events, it will be used for classes relating to aviation literature, aircraft maintenance, or meetings that might benefit from the ambience.”



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
